

WHAT IS Corva?

The California Off Road Vehicle Association (CORVA) is a varied group of outdoor recreationalists who are extremely active in promoting the positive aspects of vehicular access on public lands and protecting that right.

The group is composed of the owners of "Green Sticker" vehicles such as ATV's, motorcycles, 3-wheelers, trials bikes, and dune buggies, as well as "street-legal" 4X4 vehicles, dual sport motorcycles, bajas and desert racers.

The main purpose of CORVA is to work with the land managers for responsible off-highway vehicular access and recreation opportunities. Secondarily, we educate our membership on the constantly changing rules and regulations and promote conservation, clean-up and trail maintenance projects.

We are very active in the political arena and pay for a lobbyist in Sacramento. We work closely with the State Department of Parks and Recreation providing input to the Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation (OHMVR) Program from the users' standpoint. We provide a valuable resource to land managers in the form of dedicated OHV enthusiasts who believe in responsible vehicular access.

A portion of the budgets for California's national forests and the public lands administered by the BLM is funded by grants from the Green Sticker Program. We work with the land managers to formulate the grants and give our input about the grants to the OHMVR Program which administers them. We also review how effectively our Green Sticker money was used in each program.

We are active at all levels of the land management public process with both the BLM and USFS. We do this by commenting on environmental documents on as many issues as possible and maintaining close relationships with personnel in the field as well as the staff.

We coordinate with other multiple use organizations ranging from snow-mobiles to horse enthusiasts to protect multiple-use rights from the environmental extremists. We are "dedicated to protecting our lands for the people,"

Motorcycle Hall of Fame: A Once in a Lifetime **Experience**

Once in a lifetime you get a surprise that you never expected, and that came to me when Kathy Van Kleeck, Sr. Vice President, Government Relations, Motorcycle Industry Council and chairman of the American Motorcyclist Association (AMA) Hall of Fame Nominating committee sent me an e-mail in June congratulating me for being nominated for this prestigious award





Stories and Legends: Hall of Fame Class of 2007 Honored

A tireless advocate for off-road motorcyclists, Ed Waldheim began his involvement in motorcycling as an off-road racer. He later moved into helping organize races and ultimately into governmental offroad advocacy. Waldheim is president of the California Off-Road Vehicle Association and was appointed to the California Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation Commission by two governors and served multiple terms. He won numerous awards for his advocacy on behalf of all off-road enthusiasts, including the prestigious AMA Motorcycling Advocate Award, and continues to advance their cause with the government and in the media.

Waldheim was born in San Francisco in 1938. His family moved to Argentina, and he lived there from the time he was 10 until he was in his early 20s. Waldheim grew up multi-lingual. His family, originally from Switzerland, spoke German in their house and naturally spoke Spanish everywhere else. He grew up farming in Argentina and he had friends who had scooters and motorcycles that he would ride occasionally as a youngster.

When he became an adult, Waldheim moved back to the United States and joined

the Army. Waldheim settled in Southern California after he got out of the Army. A Riverside police officer had an old scrambles motorcycle for sale and Waldheim bought it and decided to race the well-used machine in the desert.

"I got a pair of cowboy boots went out there and nearly killed myself," Waldheim laughs.

A friend who worked for Yamaha offered to teach Ed how to ride and eventually he bought a new bike and went back out to race in the desert, this time with much more experience and better equipment. Waldheim participated in desert racing for about five years with good success until government regulations began to threaten off-road riding. In 1978, he called a meeting of various clubs and promoters to figure out how to deal with these new regulations.

"That was the end of my racing career and the beginning of working on land-use issues and advocacy," Waldheim explained.

Waldheim said that when he came into off-road riding there were really no rules. Motorcyclists could ride where they wanted and when they wanted. When the sport exploded in the 1970s with the availability

of inexpensive off-road motorcycles, things started to spiral out of control.

"We may have had it coming," Waldheim said of government regulations on riding. "It was because we didn't know any better. No one talked of or even knew about environmental concerns back then. We had a lot of learning to do about how to properly manage things."

Off-road advocate Bob Ham formed the California Off Road Vehicle Association (CORVA) in the early 1970s. CORVA helped push through legislation that would allocate a percentage of money from gasoline sales to off-road vehicles to securing and

maintaining off-road riding areas in California.

"By the time I came, in the government wasn't doing anything with this money to help off-road users," Waldheim said. "We formed our own commission so we could manage our own destiny instead of being under the direction of the Department of Parks and Recreation, whose mission didn't include us."



Waldheim personally paid Ham's fee to lobby for off-road rights until he could get the various off-road organizations to fund a lobbyist to work in the capitol in Sacramento.

Over the years, Waldheim educated himself on the ins and outs of government advocacy.

"It was by osmosis," Waldheim says. "We started going to these meetings for the California Desert Conservation Plan. Mark Anderson of the MIC and I became good friends and I learned a great deal working with him. Also, Rob Rasor, who worked in government relations at the AMA, had a big influence on directing us how to go through the different channels of the government. A lot of things we simply learned by the school of hard knocks, but we made our way through. We realized if

we didn't do something we would lose our opportunity. We had no magical plan, we just went by our guts. I went to where we had problems and would just keep working at it."

Waldheim and his wife learned how to write grant proposals and they were responsible for bringing much-needed money to develop and maintain riding areas. The grant money helped buy equipment and pay for labor to build and maintain and properly marked trails.

Waldheim often does much of this trail maintenance work himself on a volunteer basis.

"The number one key is trail maintenance," Waldheim declares. "If you don't maintain a trail, everything else falls apart. It's as simple as that. Our users don't stay on a designated trail if they aren't maintained – they'll make their own trail. That is our enemy and people just don't get it."

Waldheim is looked at by the industry as the go-to guy in off-road advocacy.

"If something needs to be done, Ed gets it done," said Kathy Van Kleek, vice president of government relations for the Motorcycle Industry Council. "As president of the California Trail Users Coalition, Ed has brought in over a million dollars in federal Recreational Trail Program grants to benefit southern California riding opportunities and to assist National Forest

and Bureau of Land Management trail development and maintenance."

Waldheim has earned many honors for his activism, including the Golden Helmet Award from the Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Division of California's Department of Parks and Recreation and the Off-Roader of the Year from the California Off-Road Vehicle Association. The main building at the Hungry Valley State Vehicular Recreation Area is named in his honor.

Nationally, the Bureau of Land Management awarded him their Volunteer of the Year award.

Under Waldheim's leadership, CORVA membership tripled and the association has maintained a leading position in advocacy and education of off-roading.

Waldheim attends hundreds of meetings a year. Virtually all of his activism is funded out of his pocket. He often tours off-road areas as an advisor to land managers. politicians. off-road commissioners, journalists and scientists. Waldheim moved to California City so he could pull out of his garage and hit the open trails of the desert, but he spends so much time traveling to meetings regarding off-road vehicles that he rarely has time to ride.

In addition to statewide off-road association, Waldheim founded Friends of Jawbone, a nonprofit organization to promote better riding at the national park

outside California City.

Waldheim also cites the economic boost the state and local governments receive from off-road riders.

"I wouldn't be surprised if it's \$10 billion" statewide, Waldheim said in a 2005 interview with Antelope Valley Press. To Waldheim, the reasons for keeping offroad areas open go well beyond economic issues, especially as a hobby for children.

"I would rather have a kid on a motorcycle than in a gang, out at a pool hall or doing graffiti," he said. "When a kid goes riding after school, he comes home too tired and dirty to go out and get in any trouble."



For Waldheim, who has been president of the statewide off-road vehicle association for the last 13 years, an average day puts him in any California city where people ride vehicles on off-highway trails. But he makes no complaint about the work, he said, because with the explosion in housing encroaching on desert riding spaces, education is the key.

Waldheim's passion for off-road riding has left a major legacy. In countless hours of working in government and on the trails have greatly benefited riders and provided an example for future advocacy.© 2007, Motorcycle Hall of Fame Museum

What an incredible weekend. What an honor to have received this honor, not so much for myself, but for all off-roaders fighting the good fight. It is because of all of you in CORVA, D-37 and the various other OHV organizations who have made it possible for us to get so much accomplished over the years to keep our trails open, and to keep access to public lands always in the forefront. That is what made this happen.

So, there you have it — a once in a life time experience. Thanks to everyone who has been part of this journey over the past 30 years.

Truckhaven Challenge XIII 2008 Update

Truckhaven Challenge XIII is alive and well and taking place at a new location. As you probably know, the 2007 Challenge was canceled to avoid a lawsuit filed by the Center for Biological Diversity (CBD) against the state and CORVA. The state became involved when it purchased about 3200 acres of land in the Truckhaven Hills area where our event has been held for twelve years. When this land was unposted private property it was perfectly legal to enter and recreate.

However the state is obligated to file a California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) document before issuing permits for events when environmental damage is possible. Although the Challenge route

was approved by state archeologists and biologists, a formal document was not completed and CBD took this opportunity to sue. Rather than risk an injunction or worse, CORVA pulled its permit request. CBD recently settled the suit with terms very favorable to motorized recreation but a full CEQA document cannot be prepared in time for our event.

Ocotillo Wells State Vehicular Recreation Area (OWSVRA) is located south of S22 and contains some of the same geologic features that make the Truckhaven Hills a great motorized recreation area. Geoff Teare and I spent two weekends touring the area with the help of a park ranger and Ed Stovin and decided we could put together a very good course for the 2008 Challenge In Ocotillo Wells.

Although the route has not been finalized and will need to be approved by the park, I can tell you that you will experience deep canyons, narrow twisting passages, rocky sections and fun mud hills as well as sandy washes. This challenge will introduce segments new to you and rarely driven by anybody. As usual I do not recommend this route to larger or stock vehicles. Please read the article on the flyer elsewhere or on the web at our website www.corva.org.

The entrance to the camping area is on Holly road off S22 2.5 miles west of route 86. A detailed map will be on the web site. This area has ramadas and a permanent toilet.

We hope to see you there!

Route Designation Plans Gain Momentum

In my last article for ORIA I summarized the history of the Route Designation Plan. This was mandated by Washington in response to the Chief Forester's identification of OHV use as one of the "four key threats" to National Forests. But as most of us know, 90% of OHV opportunity exists on federal land. The tremendous growth of the sport has put us on a collision course with attempts to manage OHV use by federal agencies.

The 19 California National Forests, known a Region 5, are all subject to the Route Designation Plan which dictates that OHV use must be restricted to designated trails only by fall 2008. As the Forests move toward this deadline OHV recreationists have become increasingly aware of the impact this Plan will have on their sport. The majority of California National Forests has completed their trail inventories, held public workshops, and is now poised to enter formalization of the designated trail systems under the NEPA process (National Environmental Protection Act of 1970).

This process begins with the forests issuing a Notice of Intent to Prepare an EIS (environmental impact statement). The Notice is published in the Federal Register, and describes changes to the Forest trail system that are being proposed. It is at this point that the Forests hold public meetings and accept written comments on their proposal, usually for a period of 30 days.

The agency then uses this public input to assist them in the drafting of "alternatives" that they will ultimately consider in making a decision on which trails may be left open. Check the status of your Forest by going to the website, www.fs.fed.us/r5, and click on the link "National Forests of California" to find your forest. Go to the "Route Designation" icon and double click to find the status of the Plan in your forest. This is sometimes located on the sidebar under "projects and plans"

At present, six forests have issued Notices of Intent. These include El Dorado, which has also issued the draft ElS, as well as Sequoia, Sierra, Mendocino, Tahoe, and Inyo. We expect Notices from Lassen, Plumas, and Humbolt-Toiyabe in the very

near future. Klamath, Six Rivers, and Shasta Trinity are soon to follow.

Many of you have heard that there has been a huge outcry by the public over the proposed trail closures in El Dorado. With that forest considering closure of 80% of the motorized trails there has been tremendous attention from both motorized recreationists and environmental activists. Everyone realizes that this Forest will set the tone for all that follows. Issues in El Dorado have been complicated by a previous lawsuit over a designated trail system that was supposed to be established in the 1990's, but the major issue there is the application of Forest Standards and Guidelines to justify closure of most trails on the grounds of excessive impact. Public involvement has been essential to persuade El Dorado to expand OHV opportunity over what was originally proposed, but this appears to be having little effect. As a result all OHV organizations have jumped into the fray, each one vying to be the foremost advocate.

The Publication of the Tahoe National Forest Notice of Intent drew substantial attention, with the formation of the Friends of Tahoe and a coalition of OHV recreation groups to influence Forest Service officials in the drafting of trail plans. Trails not present on the inventory were identified and comments were written in an attempt to keep routes open.



Mission is to work with Forest Service to maintain routes and educate forest users

In response to Eldorado National Forest's Draft Impact study, which may remove over 1,800 miles of routes in Eldorado National Forest (ENF), the non-profit group The Friends of Eldorado, (FOE) has been formed by the users of ENF. These users include a vast range of people including OHV users, hunters, campers, hikers, photographers, fishermen, etc.

The mission of FOE is to work closely with the Forest Service and various other organizations such as the Blue Ribbon Coalition and The Friends of the Rubicon to help maintain trails, roads and campsites in ENF through work-parties, forest and campsite clean-ups. 

Land Access

U.N. Wildlands Project

Many of the areas shown on The Wildlands Project maps in BLACK, as off limits to human use, already have significantly reduced public access & no management or resource harvesting through: Wilderness, Critical Habitat & Roadless Areas.

WHITE Areas are areas of Highly Regulated Use where hiking may be allowed, but no homes. Only GREEN areas will allow housing. [In this black and white reproduction of the map, green areas are very hard to distinguish. We apologize. However, it is only a fraction of the areas shown on the map – and is mostly the cities. For a full color version, visit the CORVA website to get the full impact of this map. – Erin Dyer, Editor]

Are any of the areas that you currently enjoy to recreate shown as BLACK, or off limits to human activity, on the Wildlands map?

Is your home in a WHITE Area, where housing will ultimately be prohibited through increased taxation & impossible regulations?

- In 1992 The Wildlands project was mandated by the Convention on Biological Diversity, The Wildlands Project, UN & US Man & Biosphere Program & NAFTA Border Agenda 21.
- The Agenda 21 UN document pledging to evaluate progress made in implementing the plan, was signed by President George Bush Senior in 1992.
- The President's Council on Sustainable Development (Agenda 21) was created by President Clinton in 1993, creating a method to implement The Wildlands project through Specific Plans in communities across the nation.
- In Kern County California alone, there are currently 400 Specific Plans being created at this moment.

While this may sound too incredible to be true, aren't many of the steps already in place to make The Wildlands Project & Agenda 21 a reality?

If you want to do something about stopping the Wildlands Project then:

- Read the <u>Sustainable Development Guide for Public Officials</u> (available on the website) to find out about Agenda 21, the driving force to remove people from the land & create greater government control
- Hand out the <u>Sustainable Development Guide for Public Officials</u> (available on the website) to your elected officials & friends
 - Talk to your friends & associates about it.
- Join others in your area & inform your local elected leaders, many of whom know nothing about Agenda 21 or The Wildlands Project.

Publication of the Sequoia NOI brought less attention, but solicited extensive comments under the direction of the Stewards of the Sequoia. This group held workshops, drafted maps of key routes for OHV use, and prepared detailed comments on the proposed closure of over 80% of trails.

Sierra National Forest also published the Notice. This fostered formation of the Stewards of the Sierra. Record numbers of OHV recreationists attended the public workshops held by the Forest. Again, routes not included on the inventory were identified and submitted, maps were checked, and comments were written, all by dedicated volunteers.

CORVA leadership anticipated this development and hosted a workshop with a NEPA consultant for El Dorado OHV recreationists to help them write proper comments and address potential flaws in the process. At this point the best way to assure that our routes are kept open is to participate actively with the Forest where you recreate and to submit comments during the 30 day period. We must understand that within several months each forest will publish a Draft EIS that will describe several alternative levels of OHV recreation. Publication of the DEIS opens a 45 day formal comment period. The Forest must respond in writing to comments submitted during this time, and these comments have legal implications for the agency.

The best approach to the Route Designation Plan seems to be to write very specific comments on specific routes that you know that justifies keeping them open. The Forest can consider routes for inclusion on the trail system even if they have evidence of resource damage if they are particularly important. For example, a route that is part of a loop, that has a special destination or view, allows access to dispersed camping, or provides a fuel or water stop, has the best chance of inclusion.


Seasonal closures have also surfaced as a critical issue. Most NOI's indicate a blanket closure of trails for six to eight months of the year, in some cases from November to July. It is essential to comment on why this closure period should be shortened and based on seasonal and local climate variations.

And above all, volunteer trail maintenance performed by OHV recreationists enhances the credibility of groups that are attempting to influence this process. Get involved and do a weekend or two on a trail crew. You will have fun, make new friends, and gain a better appreciation of your routes.

Some argue that there is no point in spending time fighting the agency, arguing that they will just close everything anyway. I'd have to admit, at time I feel this way too. But unless we get involved and support our form of recreation we will get the routes

they think we should have, not the ones we want, and we will be certainly worse off than if we speak out.

And don't forget to speak to your legislators. Write to them, call them and if you can meet with them. Tell them what is happening to our riding areas. As public officials they can influence the process in ways we cannot.

I will end this article with a plea for unification of our efforts in this endeavor. Advocates of different forms of recreation have long fought among themselves over turf and resources. This has led to the failure of OHV advocacy on many past occasions with the fragmentation of the sport into tiny entities without political clout. Recently we held a critical alliance together achieved significant accomplishment with the passage of SB 742. This shows what can be done if we work together.

All of us have a favorite pursuit, whether it is 4x4 wheeling, quad riding, sand railing, motorcycle single track, or snowmobiling. But we will all be subject to the same restrictions under the Route Designation Plan, so let's stick together and help each other out with Route Designation. In the words of Ben Franklin, "Now is the time for us to hang together, or most assuredly, we will hang separately!"
